
Directions

Southbound:

Take Exit 192 from I-5 and stay right to turn right onto 41st Street. Follow 41st Street and E Mukilteo Blvd to Olympic Blvd. Turn right onto Olympic Blvd. and continue for just over a mile as it curves to the left. Watch for a sharp right turn at an unnamed road that will take you to the Howarth Park parking lot. If you get to the Howarth Park viewpoint you've gone too far.

Northbound:

Take Exit 192 from I-5 and stay in the left to turn onto 41st Street. Follow 41st Street and E Mukilteo Blvd to Olympic Blvd. Turn right onto Olympic Blvd. and continue for just over a mile as it curves to the left. Watch for a sharp right turn at an unnamed road that will take you to the Howarth Park parking lot.

In the late 1800s, railroad construction along the marine shoreline cut off the beach from the sandy bluffs that feed them.

To improve the degraded shoreline, Snohomish County completed a beach nourishment project between Mukilteo and Everett, placing **22,156 tons of sediment at six locations**. Over time, the sand will naturally distribute along the shoreline, improving the beaches.

The County also worked with the City of Everett and the Port of Everett to remove a bulkhead at Howarth Park and **increase the useable beach area by more than 120 feet** for both people and juvenile Chinook salmon.
