Derelict Vessel Bill -

Lucas informed the committee that he provided testimony on HB2769 (companion SB6528), which is a state bill that aims to prevent derelict vessels.

Billy Frank Jr. Coalition Update -

Lucas is planning to bring Executive Committee questions to the Coalition's coordinator, Pegen Frank, to gather further information about member expectations and coalition objectives.

Retreat -

The Planning committee has begun developing an agenda with the help of our facilitator Hilary Wilkinson. One agenda topic has a strong focus on MRC support, which is also related to specific action items in the current operations plan. Questions have been posed to the MRCs to help guide this agenda topic. MRCs have been asked to respond to the questions by 3/16.

NOAA Collaboration -

Lucas and Chris Castner met with NOAA representatives to explore collaborative opportunities. He and Chris are evaluating the outcomes of the meeting and plan to follow up with NOAA. One topic that was discussed was the possibility of Veterans Corps providing some capacity to the Commission. Lucas is scheduling a call with program coordinators to gather more information.

Job vacancy update -

Lucas and Dana are reviewing Ecosystem Project Coordinator applications. This will be a full time 6-8 month position to assist on a variety of projects, including data analysis of regional monitoring and restoration work.

Welcome and Introductions

Alan Clark opened the meeting and facilitated introductions.

The minutes from the December Northwest Straits (NWS) Commission meeting were approved by consensus as written.

NWS Commission - committee reports

Executive Committee

Elsa reported out on the Executive Committee. The committee is discussing an invitation to join the Billy Frank Jr. Salmon Coalition and the Commission submitted comments to the EPA on their current National Estuary Program (NEP) funding model review.

Science Advisory Committee

Dana reported that the committee is working on the meeting calendar and work plan for 2020. Looking forward to social scientist Kathy Wolf joining the committee this year. The committee is planning to generate a project priority list in case of new funding opportunities.

External Relations Committee

Lucas reported that the committee has a meeting scheduled in March. Main focus has been conversations with NOAA on shared priorities. Will have more information after March.

Communication Committee

Sasha updated the group on the status of a Request for Qualifications and Quotations (RFQQ) that will be posted by Ecology in early February. The RFQQ will solicit bids for a contractor to provide a communications audit and plan. The work is anticipated to be done during the late spring through summer, depending on the eventual contract timing.

Director's report



minutes

Lucas reminded the group that the Commission approved a policy in September that is part of the Rules of Procedure. He distributed copies of the current rules for the Commission to review and confirm approval at the next meeting in February.

The Governor's office has reappointed Nan McKay and Tom Cowan to serve on the Commission. They are now beginning a four-year term.

A new staff member for the Communication and Outreach Specialist position has been hired and will begin on February 3. Her name is Katie Harris. A position announcement for a temporary Ecosystem Project Coordinator was posted and is now closed. The review and hiring process is now underway. This position is estimated as a six-month position.

The 2020 planning retreat will be on March 26-27 at Padilla Bay. Hilary Wilkinson of Veda Environmental is facilitating. Lucas shared a draft version of advance questions for MRCs and some background information about the questions and the purpose, along with some guidance about how to approach them. The Commission discussed the questions and provided input for Lucas to revise the document before sending to MRCs. Lucas plans to send the questions directly to MRCs on Monday, February 3 with responses due by March 16 to allow time for all MRCs to discuss it as a group at their meeting.

Presentation: Island MRC – Sea Level Rise Workshops

Anna Toledo presented on the Island MRC's Sea Level Rise workshops. A copy of the presentation is available. Copies of the workshop presentations and sea level rise materials can be found here. To focus on local actions during the workshops, Anna talked about local strategies such as building higher, moving houses back, and natural softshore protection. A key point made is that armoring is not meant to be flood protection, it's designed for erosion protection.

Presentation: Sound Water Stewards

Linda Ridder presented about the Sound Waters Stewards program, which provides training to volunteers in Island County to support Puget Sound community outreach, stewardship and citizen science. Sound Water Stewards has trained 720 volunteers and volunteers log more than 20,000 volunteer hours annually. The Sound Waters One-Day University is held the first Saturday in February, and Linda encouraged everyone to attend.

Public Comment

There was no public comment.

Northwest Straits (NWS) Foundation update

Caroline Gibson provided an update on the Northwest Straits Foundation. The Foundation has operationalized their fundraising plan by quarter, and they are emphasizing individual and corporate giving, along with partnerships with business. The Foundation board has two new board members: Lee Whitford (Jefferson County) and Emily Schaller (San Juan County). Each brings a different skill set to the

board. The Foundation currently has a development position that is open until filled. The Opportunity Fund for 2020 has an estimated \$20,000 available, and the Foundation anticipates issuing a call for applications to MRCs in the next few months. A total of \$140,000 has gone out to MRCs since the Opportunity Fund was started.

<u>Puget Sound Partnership (Partnership) update</u>

Laura Rivas attended the meeting on behalf of the Partnership and provided a report. The Partnership is beginning a National Estuary Program evaluation process that requires a written report due in mid-March. A corresponding site visit will happen in June. Partnership staff will keep us informed about the process.

The federal National Estuary Program budget was approved with good news, as the Puget Sound geographic program was approved at \$33 million, which is up \$5 million from last year. How those funds will be programmed has not yet been determined.

Puget Sound Day on the Hill is coming up April 28-29, and Laura encouraged those who are able to attend to go. Information is available on their website at https://www.psp.wa.gov/psdoth2020.php.

Welcome – Island County

Island County Commissioner Janet St. Clair welcomed the group to Island County. She is interested in the science behind the work of the MRC and Commission, and how to talk to people about it. Island County has the largest contiguous shoreline of any county in the state so allocating resources and policy around shorelines makes sense, and she is always seeking to improve or add to the protection of the Salish Sea. Commissioner St Clair expressed her appreciation for the Commission and the work that it does.

In response to a question about the value of the local MRC, Commissioner St. Clair noted that to get good policy you must have good data and tell the story. She appreciates that the MRC is volunteer driven and non-partisan, and is a unique voice that provides information that isn't vested in protecting their job or turf. This is powerful regardless of where someone is on the political spectrum.

In addition to marine issues, she shared that the County is currently spending a lot of time on health care, launching a long-term expanded broadband effort, looking at growth management, and gearing up to conduct the 2020 census.

Business items

Dana updated the group about the Puget Sound Kelp Conservation and Recovery Plan and the comments submitted during the public comment period that ended January 22. She shared some of the input from public comment, both from individuals and organizations. There are other potential next steps and roles for the Commission moving forward. The lack of funding was recognized as an issue for implementing the Plan. The Washington Department of Natural Resources will plan to lead working groups for research and monitoring as well as policy and planning for the next two years.



The MRC symposium originally planned for January will be re-booted and scheduled for early April. Dana noted that we are hoping to schedule it as an annual event in January. She is seeking MRC feedback on the draft agenda, particularly to ensure that it will serve what the MRCs want. It is expected to be an opportunity to share information about current projects.

Lucas reported that some individuals have been discussing creation of a mitigation bank in Washington State, primarily to facilitate faster removal of creosote pilings. This is still in very early stages of discussion.

Lucas shared the Operations Plan and reviewed and focused on a short list of those items that are behind schedule or need additional focus. The Operations Plan will be part of the discussion at the upcoming retreat in March.

Lucas reported out on a few bills introduced in the WA State Legislature: HB2769/SB6528 on prevention of derelict vessels, SB6147 on shoreline stabilization, SB6454 on anadromous fish preservation, HB2549 on salmon recovery in the growth management act, HB2550 on net ecological gain, HJM40112 on international year of the salmon, and SB6213 on polystyrene product phase out.

Sasha reminded MRCs to watch for an update on the process for year two project proposals that will need to be done.

Clallam

Alan noted that the MRC has traditionally done oiled wildlife and HAZWOPER training, but they are rethinking how they will carry out their oil spill training. The MRC is working with the county commissioners on climate resiliency. They currently have two open positions to be filled.

Island

Elsa reported that MRC member Linda Rhodes has term limited out so they have a vacancy. Linda will remain involved as a non-voting science advisor to the MRC. The MRC is holding a retreat on February 18 and will be part of the Great Northwest Glass Quest (www.thegreatnwglassquest.com) on February 14-23. In their forage fish sampling eggs were found in Hidden Beach samples. The MRC is working on feasibility and conceptual design for a restoration project at Hoypus Point or Possession Point.

Jefferson

Jeff reported that Jefferson has seven new members and a new staff member, Monica Montgomery. There is some loss of institutional knowledge, but some very involved new members. A new forage fish



monitoring site in Discovery Bay is currently on hold due to questions about site ownership. Planning for rain gardens to be installed in 2020 continues.

San Juan

Phil reported that San Juan MRC has people at the Seattle Boat Show to talk to people and boaters and distribute the whale warning flag. A presentation on the project will be given at the Salish Sea Ecosystem Conference in April, along with their Plastic Free Salish Sea as part of the film program and the Marine Stewardship Area Plan in the poster session. There is currently one vacancy on the MRC to be filled.

Skagit

Phyllis reported that Kevin Anderson was appointed to replace Sarah Tchang from the Port of Anacortes, and Matt Castle replaces Todd Woodard from Samish Indian Nation. The MRC is partnering with Padilla Bay Reserve for Salish Sea Stewards and Kids on the Beach. Fidalgo Bay Day will be held on August 29, 2020.

Snohomish

Snohomish MRC submitted a written report. The MRC has six new members, and have elected a new representative to the Commission, Sarah Brown. The MRC is finalizing a contract for their project to prioritize piling removal in the Snohomish River estuary.

Whatcom

Bob reported that the MRC has six new member appointments to the MRC and two reappointments. The North Sound Stewards program kickoff event drew 25 people. The MRC is lining up their speakers for the 2020 public speaker series.

Roundtable

Elsa mentioned that Restore America's Estuaries has a call for proposals for their summit out, which can be found online at https://estuaries.org/events/2020-summit/. Initiative session encouraged.

Commission staff highlights- [February 2020]

2020 Retreat – The Northwest Straits Initiative retreat will be held March 26-27 at Padilla Bay. Katie sent registration information to all members of the Commission, the Foundation board, and staff from both organizations. Hilary Wilkinson will serve as the facilitator, and an agenda is currently being developed by a planning committee. MRCs received a set of questions from Lucas that are part of the preparation for retreat sessions. Responses are due back to Lucas by March 16. The retreat agenda is expected to be completed March 20 or 23.

Kelp – A 2019 kelp monitoring WebEx is scheduled for March 6 to review the data and how the season went. An in-person workshop on planning for the 2020 kelp monitoring season is scheduled for May 6, location TBD. The Puget Sound Kelp Conservation and Recovery Plan revisions are wrapping up after incorporating feedback from the public review. The goal is to release the final plan in March.

Communications – Commission staff are exploring opportunities to work with a communications consultant to review communications strategies and create a communications plan. The Dept. of Ecology posted a Request for Qualifications and Quotations on February 7 and the bidding opportunity will close on March 4. Sasha has identified an evaluation committee to provide review of bids submitted, and a contract resulting from the bids is expected to start in May.

Hiring — Katie Harris is the new addition to the team as the Communications and Outreach Specialist. The posting for a short-term Ecosystem Coordinator closed the week of January 27. Dana and Lucas are conducting phone and in person interviews.

MRC Symposium – The Symposium is scheduled for April 3 at Padilla Bay. The goals of the event are 1) bring together members and staff to share near and long-term project ideas, 2) share nuts and bolts of how specific projects were started and funded, how they are run, challenges they found, lessons learned, 3) develop cross MRC collaboration, MRC networking, and regional project development.

Salish Sea Ecosystem Conference — Sasha, Dana, Lucas and Suzanne will attend the conference. Dana and Suzanne will be there to share the kelp survey project, Lucas will present on collaborative conservation and lead a citizen science session, and Sasha is serving on the volunteer coordination committee and as a social media captain for the event.

Puget Sound Day on the Hill – Lucas is planning to attend the event in Washington, DC in late April, and is currently scheduling meetings with members of the federal delegation and others to make effective use of his time in the area.

MRC Lead Staff Meeting – The MRC Lead Staff meeting will be held on June 18 at Padilla Bay.

Project Updates (project activities and highlights from the past month, any new projects identified): <u>Forage Fish:</u> Regular sampling continues at Cornet Bay, Ala Spit, Hidden Beach, and Seahorse Siesta. Sampling at Glendale was re-established in January.

<u>Seining:</u> The MRC, supported by the Northwest Straits Foundation and Island County Lead Entity, is returning to conduct seining at Cornet Bay in 2020 and 2021. A great group of volunteers is seining about every two weeks from January-June.

<u>Hoypus Point and Possession Point Restoration Feasibility:</u> The MRC, Island County, NWSF, and WA State Parks is working with Blue Coast Engineering to conduct a feasibility study at both sites, and bring one site to conceptual design. Project Updates (project activities and highlights from the past month, any new projects identified):

Monitoring:

- a. **Fort Townsend:** Forage fish sampling will be done on Feb 27, 2020. This may be the final survey for this restoration site (potentially one more in March), as this marks the fifth year of monitoring post-restoration waiting to hear back from Jason and Lisa.
- b. Adelma Beach: Forage fish sampling was done Feb 17, 2020.
- c. **Kelp:** Nothing to report.

- 2. <u>Rain Gardens:</u> Working with the city engineer to identify potential rain garden sites to collaborate on with the City of Port Townsend. Maintenance was performed on the rain garden at 1st Security Bank.
- 3. <u>Education & Outreach:</u> Intend to appoint a project lead at the March MRC meeting. Will be discussing member interest in Digging for Dinner, Wooden Boat Festival, Earth Day, etc.
- 4. <u>Olympia Oysters:</u> Permit authorized by Army Corps of Engineers to add cultch to Discovery Bay sites. Department of Ecology has determined that an Individual Section 401 certification will not be required and distribution of cultch can proceed as directed by the Corps. Working on permit from WDFW for transferring shells from Taylor Shellfish. Plan to add cultch at both the Powerline & Lagoon sites in Discovery Bay in April.
- 5. <u>Voluntary No-Anchor Zones:</u> Lost a marker buoy at the end of Boat Haven, totaling two that have been lost in recent months.

Forage fish monitoring: In communication with Lisa (WDFW) to potentially add a new forage fish Index Site at Dabob Bay on the Toandos Peninsula, where an MRC member has shoreline property.

PT sewer outfall: The subcommittee is editing its letter to the City of Port Townsend and waiting to see the city's upcoming presentation before finalizing and sending to the BoCC for approval.

<u>Update on NW Straits Foundation projects:</u>

NWSF Opportunity Fund: The Rain Garden training for landscape professionals and high-level volunteers will take place March 24th and March 31st at the Cape George Clubhouse. MRC members Laura Jo Severson, Jeff Dyer and Kendra Smith along with MRC administrator Frances Robertson all assisted with educating boat show attendees on best boating practices around whales in the Salish Sea. In addition to the boat show effort the MRC also published a storyboard outlining the efforts of the County and the MRC over the years for Southern Resident killer whale stewardship. This storyboard was produced by communications fellow, Hillary Shedd and was made possible through funding from the Northwest Straits Foundation. Plastic Free Salish Sea: The PFSS group comprising of MRC member and other community partners continued to work towards a number of projects. These included capital improvement project to install water fountains on San Juan and Lopez Islands –a project made possible through a local LTAC grant, and started the contracting work necessary for the next phase of the PFSS outreach efforts in the production of a dedicated website. The group also advertised for a research intern who will be assisting with the production of toolkits. The project lead, MRC Chair Karin Roemers-Kleven presented about the project at the Sound Waters University on February 1st on Whidbey Island. The group made the decision to not hold a workshop on Lopez this year and subsequently the grant will be amended in April to reflect this.

MSA Plan update: Planning for the 2020 Marine Managers Workshop is in full swing. Invitations to speakers and attendees were dispatched in early February and a draft agenda will be available by the end of the month. Efforts to obtain information related to the biodiversity targets identified in the 2007 plan continue with MSA intern Abigail Ames working to follow up with all those that have not yet responded to the survey request.

Events/Meetings (including upcoming events/meetings and/or information on meetings/events from past month such as number of participants or highlights):

• MRC Meeting Highlights- February 13: The Committee provided feedback to the questions addressed to the MRCs for the NWSI 2020 retreat, reviewed the MRC Symposium agenda, and provided project updates.

Funding updates (newly-awarded grants, in-kind support or other funding commitments): No updates.

Project Updates (progress from past month on existing project, any new projects identified, project activities):

- Salish Sea Stewards: Classes are free and will be held every Tuesday starting March 10th through May 12th from 1pm-5pm at Padilla Bay. The application deadline is March 1, 2020. Applications are available on the MRC website. The training schedule is very close to being finalized. Last week the training announcement was posted online at all the local online news outlets including two local newspapers. So far only six people have registered for the training. Our goal is 20-25. Please help spread the word and share the link to the Salish Sea Stewards Facebook page.
- Fidalgo Bay Day: The event will be held Saturday, August 29, 2020 at the Fidalgo Bay Resort. Save the Date cards were distributed at the Storming the Sound Event in La Conner. The County Intern will take the lead in coordinating Fidalgo Bay Day this year. Jay Lind will continue to serve as Event Chair. The event planning subcommittee will be meeting soon to discuss task assignments, timeline, and budget. The Anacortes Green Club has agreed to help out with the kids' activities. Diver Laura will once again host the very popular virtual reality diving experience.
- <u>Bowman Bay Restoration</u>: Plant maintenance will start again in May or June. Monthly beach seining and forage fish surveys continue at this site. Lots of newly hatched surf smelt were caught in the seine net at the restoration site.
- <u>Forage Fish Surveys</u>: Surveys continue at the Bowman Bay, NW March's Point, and Kukatali Preserve restoration sites, as well as the three index sites (Similk Bay, Guemes Channel at Ship Harbor, and Samish Island). The County just hired a new intern who will be trained to take the lead on the surveys at the three index sites.
- <u>Kids on the Beach</u>: The program will start up again in April. Volunteers will be recruited to help with activities on the beach.
- <u>Pinto Abalone Recovery</u>: Surveys started up again this month and will continue over the next month or two. The preliminary results from last year's experimental outplanting of younger and much smaller abalone indicated only a 10% survival rate compared to the 20-25% survival rate of the larger juvenile abalone outplants. However, the caveat is that it is much harder to find the smaller abalone in the rocks and algae than the larger abalone. They also might be staying

hidden beneath the rocks for protection until they get a little bigger. More monitoring is needed before any final conclusions can be made. Puget Sound Restoration Fund, in collaboration with Western Washington University, is applying for grant funding to establish abalone grow-out tanks in remote locations from the Manchester hatchery including the Shannon Point Marine Center. They are interested in working with local high school students and community volunteers to help take care of the abalone in the thanks.

- Olympia Oyster Restoration: Field work will likely start up again in April, 2020 through July. The
 monitoring will be reduced this year. The larger oyster beds will now only be monitored on a
 three year cycle. Paul Dinnel was interviewed for an article about Olympia oyster restoration in
 the United Press International. Paul has also been asked to present on Olympia oysters for
 Skagit MRC's Salish Sea Stewards training as well as Whatcom MRC's North Sound Stewards
 training.
- <u>Kayak Kelp Surveys</u>: There will be a kelp WebEx meeting on Friday March 6th from 9:30am-11:30am to review the MRCs' 2019 kelp monitoring season data. Surveys will likely start up again in June or July 2020.

The February 6 MRC meeting featured a presentation from Lisa Kaufman, NWSF about the Shore Friendly Program and ways the MRC might get involved this year. Lisa also discussed the potential to host an Orca Forum - similar to what other MRC's have hosted - at the beginning of the boating season.

The MRC met with staff from BP and DNR to discuss the development and installation of interpretive sign at the Point Whitehorn Marine Reserve. BP has donated funding for this project. The group will develop four signs to be installed at the lookout area.

The Public Speaker Series subcommittee met to continue developing the 2019 calendar of speakers. The MRC has confirmed speakers for April, May and June. It is likely that effective removal trapping will require more resources that WDFW and WA Sea Grant can bring to Drayton Harbor specifically.
