Welcome and Tribal Acknowledgement

Jamie Stephens opened the meeting with the Tribal Acknowledgment and introductions.

The June 26, 2026, Northwest Straits Commission meeting minutes were approved by consensus.

Clallam Marine Resource Committee (MRC) Site Visit: Pigeon Guillemot Monitoring

Clallam MRC Member Ed Bowlby led a site visit of the Port Williams [Pigeon Guillemot monitoring site](#). Dedicated volunteers follow the [Salish Sea Guillemot Network](#) survey protocol to monitor the species and promote community science contributions to regional research. Ed highlighted that Pigeon Guillemots’ use of coastal bluffs for nesting and subtidal habitat for feeding makes them an excellent indicator of nearshore habitat health.

Remarks from Clallam County Commissioner Mark Ozias

Clallam County Commissioner Mark Ozias welcomed the Commission to Clallam County and expressed his gratitude for the work of MRCs. He specifically called out education and outreach work, kelp bed monitoring, pigeon guillemot monitoring, and Olympia oyster restoration projects. He praised the advisory role of MRCs and emphasized that implementing advice from MRCs gives him confidence in the longevity and merit of policies.

MRC Reports

Clallam MRC – Alan Clark

- The kelp team successfully completed their first survey at Clallam Bay with new volunteers from the Olympic Paddling Club. More than 30 sea otters were spotted!
- The forage fish team collected samples from 4 beaches and found large numbers of surf smelt in Dungeness Bay. New volunteer Rian Robinson is supporting with collection protocols.
- Olympia oyster restoration work was highlighted in the [Northwest Treaty Tribes summer newsletter](#). Check it out on page 10!
- 24-hour Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response (HAZWOPER) trainings are set for October 27 – 28.

Island MRC – Ken Collins

- Monitoring and restoration projects are moving along well.
- The MRC continues to work on their 2027-2030 strategic plan and will use the August meeting to hear from Skagit MRC about the successful creation and implementation of their strategic plan.

Jefferson MRC – Brenda Johnson

- The Olympia oyster restoration team surveyed Discovery Bay and Mystery Bay. 14 volunteers collected 142 samples over 4 hours at Discovery Bay.
- Kelp bed kayak monitoring found the North Beach bed is growing and has many reproductive leaves. Unfortunately, it has been a challenge to attract volunteers.
- The Mystery Bay management plan, created in 2010 to protect the bay from heavy boat traffic and mooring, is currently under review.

San Juan MRC – Provided written report

- The MRC has successfully supported 50 Tier 1 HAZWOPER responders through all their training.
- Remotely operated underwater vehicles (ROVs) are successfully removing derelict crab pots, and drones are identifying derelict vessels and tracking boater behavior.

Skagit MRC – Lynne Wenberg - Davidson

- After disappearing for 2-3 years, the East Shannon Point bull kelp bed is returning with healthy but loosely formed blades! Invasive sargassum may play a role in the disappearance.
- Many kelp monitoring kayakers did not return this season, though the local paddle club has helped fill vacant volunteer slots.



- A total of 397 derelict pots were identified and mapped for targeted removal. The 3 contracted dive teams removed 75 derelict crab pots in Similk Bay in June. ROVs have removed 5 pots so far and will continue focusing on deep water targets.

Snohomish MRC – Phil Salditt

- The MRC approved two letters of support for Tulalip Tribes. One for European green crab invasive species management funding and the other for culvert removal funding.
- Kelp and eelgrass monitoring are in progress, and the county has purchased kayaks and safety gear to support the project.
- Derelict vessel identification and forage fish monitoring are both in progress.
- The Marine Vegetation Outreach Subcommittee developed a 1-pager to share with boating groups and is planning to give more detailed presentations as well.
- Crabber outreach at the Everett boat launch resulted in 191 contacts over the 2 days of opening weekend.

Whatcom MRC – Rick Beauregard

- Low phytoplankton numbers were recorded at the 2 sampled sites, potentially due to high water temperatures. Additionally, no phytotoxins were found in sampled shellfish.
- Olympia oyster monitoring in Drayton Harbor and Chuckanut Bay is ongoing.
- The MRC established an Advisory Subcommittee and has been meeting to discuss their mission and process.
- Humpback and orca whales have recently been sighted in Semiahmoo Bay.

Committee Updates

Executive Committee

Lynne shared that the Committee discussed NW Straits Commission budget planning elements, including the need to better understand baseline funding requirements for the Commission and MRCs, which can help inform future budget decisions. Next steps will include reaching out to MRC staff and chairs to gather MRC budget information.

Other topics included the possibility of having a 1-day conference every other year instead of the 2-day conference every year, reviewing commissioner roles and responsibilities, and Environmental Leadership Award nominees, which the Committee will vote on in the coming weeks.



External Relations

MRC congressional and legislative site visits are in progress. Rick Larsen is visiting Skagit County next week. The visit will include kayaking kelp beds with Skagit MRC and Olympia oyster restoration with Samish Indian Nation and Swinomish Indian Tribal Community.

Senator Murray and Representative Randall's staff will visit Jefferson County next week. Jefferson and Clallam representatives will join the tour, which is scheduled to highlight pinto abalone restoration, kelp conservation, and Olympia oyster restoration.

Representative Ramel will visit Whatcom MRC's Olympia oyster restoration field day in August. Skagit, Island, Jefferson, and Clallam MRCs are also discussing site visit options for state legislators in August and September.

No update on reauthorization. It is awaiting passage in the Senate.

Science Advisory Committee (SAC)

The SAC met on July 8 and discussed Collaborative Sessions and the Pre-Conference SAC Workshop.

Two of three Collaborative Sessions between the SAC and MRCs have already happened. The goal of these sessions is to help MRCs work through processes, questions, or challenges on existing projects or the development of new project and advisory ideas. The SAC discussed the success of these sessions and how SAC members can best prepare for them. Please contact Dana Oster (oster@nwstraits.org) by September 18 if your MRC is interested in a Collaborative Session.

The SAC is planning a Pre-MRC Conference Workshop that will be offered on the first day of the Conference, November 6. The workshop will focus on effective ecological monitoring, and participants will leave with a better general understanding of the different types of monitoring programs and how monitoring purpose shapes decisions about design, partners, and endpoints. This workshop will be a mix of learning and applying what we cover to case studies and your own work or ideas. Registration and more information will be included in MRC Conference registration in August.

Business Items

Strategic Plan and Funding Review

Lucas gave a review of the [strategic plan](#) action items and Commission funding.

Commissioners discussed the need for MRCs to be proactive about recruitment. They noted that potential recruits may feel they aren't qualified, don't have the time, or are not familiar enough with MRCs.



Elsa cautioned the Commission not to be overly prescriptive by mandating specific recruitment requirements for MRCs. Instead, recruitment tactics could be framed as suggestions or recommendations designed to help MRCs overcome recruitment challenges.

Lynne recommended providing a briefing to MRC members on the outcomes of the meetings between NW Straits Commission staff, MRC staff, and county leadership.

Commissioners discussed the benefits of the strategic plan and shared their delight that it is being used as an effective tool to implement actions.

Project Updates

Kelp Update

Jeff Whitty gave an overview of MRCs' kayak-based kelp surveys and the [accompanying Story Map](#). Compared to [SoundIQ](#), where anyone can view and download the data, this Story Map provides context for the project and visually highlights the data and work of each MRC. It includes an interactive data map, photos, testimonials, and trends. Please contact Jeff Whitty (whitty@nwstraits.org) with any questions.

Vessel Turn-in Event Planning

Dana Oster updated the Commission on her work with the Makah Tribe and the Department of Natural Resources to run a vessel turn-in recycling event in August. They expect an estimated 28 boats, including those brought in by the Coast Guard from the marina, abandoned on the Makah Reservation, and turned in by Tribal community members. This will add to the 29 vessels removed in 2023-2025 and 92 vessels collected during turn-in events in 2024 and 2025.

Puget Sound Partnership

There was no update this month.



Roundtable

Representative Larsen's staff asked for the Commission's thoughts on the planned Alberta to British Columbia oil pipeline. Commissioners shared:

- Alberta crude is diluted bitumen, which sinks in the water. Technology does not exist to clean it up after a spill.
- San Juan County and the MRC have been focused on spill prevention by seeking an emergency rescue tug to be stationed in Sydney or Roche Harbor. They feel prevention will become more important as traffic increases.
- Risk assessments have been done for crude oil, but not bitumen.
- [Southern Resident Orca Task Force recommendations](#) included reducing the threat of oil spills (recommendation 24) as well as a recommendation to conduct an environmental review to minimize whale strikes and underwater noise (recommendation 49).
- Baseline habitat assessments and monitoring are needed to be effective at oil spill cleanup.
- [Strait Ecosystem Recovery Network](#) (24th Congressional District) has discussed meeting with Canadian counterparts about oil spill risk and planning. Details were not known, but we could ask around if needed.
- Folks expressed concern for the crab fishery and kelp habitat in the vicinity of the tanker traffic.

This input will be provided to Rep. Larsen's staff.

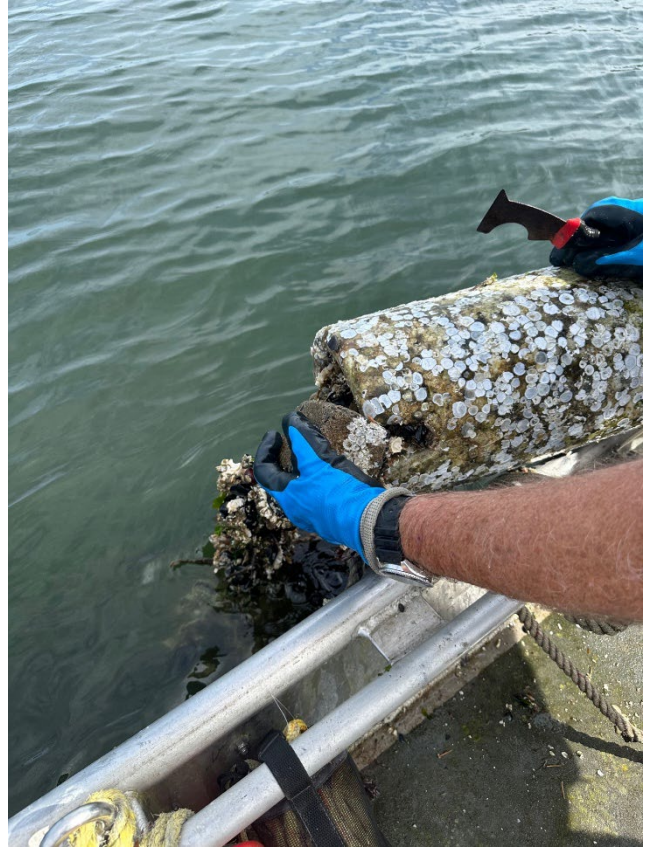
- MRC has been asked by DOH to support the update of the 2011 Mystery Bay Management Plan.

San Juan County MRC Monthly Report

Month/Year: July 2026

Key Items for Verbal Report-Out

The MRC represented at the San Juan County Fair with a booth in conjunction with the San Juan County Department of Environmental Stewardship. MRC Members Olivia Graham and Flora Vaught presented about eelgrass and MRC outreach at the Green Village Speaker Series.

At the August MRC meeting, MRC members finalized scoring as the citizens advisory group for Salmon Recovery ranking the socio-economic value of proposed salmon recovery projects. Two projects will move forward: one to remove key stressors located in eelgrass such as creosote pilings, derelict docks, floats, and boathouses and the second is to pursue a conservation easement at an undeveloped shoreline parcel.

Plastic Free Salish Sea participated in the San Juan County Fair Trashion Fashion show by crafting outfits made from boat shrink wrap and plastic film recycling bin materials. The key messaging with the outfits was that our society is so dependent on plastic, that it is time to start new and work towards being plastic free! We use plastic materials for such a temporary amount of time, yet they last in our environment for decades. Fairgoers were hopefully inspired by this message to think before they shrink (wrap) their boats!

Derelict Vessel Prevention	- Derelict Vessel surveys have continued. - An educational flier for reporting derelict vessels (among other marine interests like green crab, oil spills, etc.) was created for the SJC fair. We used this flier to push reporting messaging at this community event and provided the public with resources for how and who to report issues to.
Marine Stewardship Area	- Dock talks and whale flag distribution have been ongoing throughout summer. - A brief knowledge assessment survey has been released to gauge public awareness of the Marine Stewardship Area and focal targets within, particularly kelp and eelgrass. 28 surveys were collected at the County Fair. The survey will be open for a few more weeks to gather insights: https://www.jotform.com/form/262227118110040
Eelgrass Protection	Olivia Graham and Flora Vaught presented at the Green Village Speaker Series at the County Fair. Their talk engaged community in the wonders of eelgrass and MRC outreach endeavors like dock talks and passing out whale warning flags.
Plastic Free Salish Sea	- PFSS participated in the County Fair Trashion Fashion Show with outfits made from boat shrink wrap. The key message was how our society is married to plastic and we need to break free. By inspiring others to use less plastic, we hope our community will think twice before resorting to single-use plastics and make a sustainable choice. - The Youth Conservation Corp helped to audit one week's worth of plastic film recycling. The team sorted the materials into true plastic film, multi-layer film, contamination, and reusable bags. It was interesting comparing this data with that of 2024. Our community is doing a much better job of putting correct materials in the bin. Despite the large volume, its great to see this plastic recycled instead of taking up space in landfills. - Save the Date – Fall Great Islands Cleanup September 26

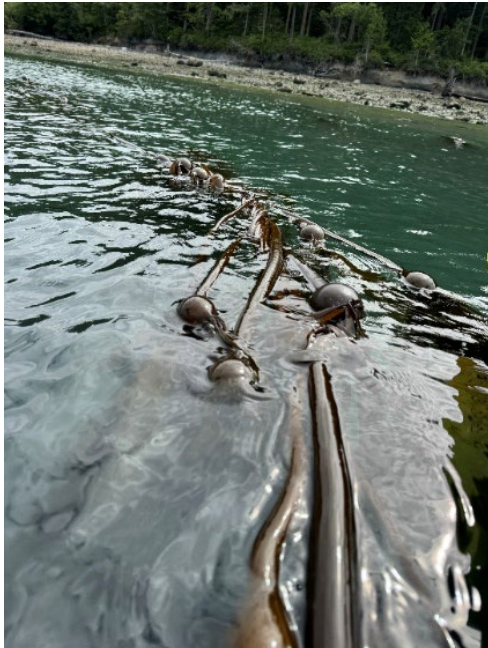

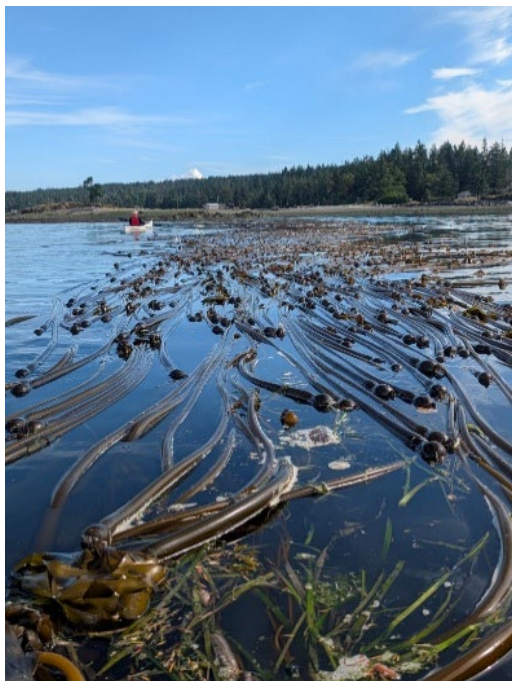

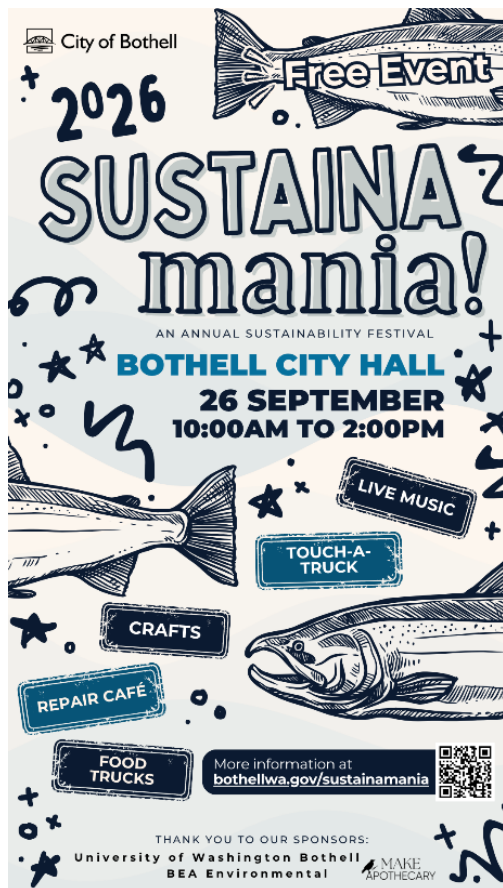

Key Items for Verbal Report-Out

The MRC and volunteers returned to North Chuckanut Bay on August 11th to establish 3 Olympia oyster restoration plots. In total, 24 people participated, representing the Whatcom MRC, City of Bellingham, Northwest Maritime Center, Bellingham Technical College, Western Washington University, Washington Conservation Corps, Lummi Natural Resources, the Nooksack tribe, the Garden of the Salish Sea Curriculum, and the NWSC.

The two MRC Wildcat Cove interns conclude their internship at the end of August. They provided a fantastic presentation to the full MRC during the August 6th meeting and will be meeting with State Parks staff to provide an overview of their findings and recommendations for future actions.

The MRC has a few upcoming outreach events including a stream and beach walk during Whatcom Water Week on September 15th, tabling at Bellingham SeaFeast on September 26th, and is working on putting together an activity for Orca Recovery Day on October 17th.

DNR Legislative Mooring Buoy Updates

DNR is proposing to update the mooring buoy statute [79.105.430](#) . Please see below for more information, including how to comment on the proposed changes. Comment period closes **September 14th**.

NOTICE:

DNR is proposing changes to the mooring buoy statute [79.105.430](#) this upcoming 2027 legislative session to address the management issues surrounding recreational mooring buoys on state-owned aquatic lands.

Issue:

As stewards of 2.6 million acres of state-owned aquatic land (SOAL), DNR has the responsibility to manage land use in a way that fosters water-dependent uses, encourages public use and access, utilizes renewable resources, and protects the environment.

Unauthorized, unpermitted mooring buoys are a long-time and growing problem in Washington state. Unchecked proliferation of buoys on SOAL can

- interfere with fishing, including geoduck harvesting
- degrade nearshore environments
- interfere with ingress and egress rights of other landowners
- cause closures of shellfish beds
- impede navigation
- result in abandoned and derelict vessels

Currently, DNR has insufficient funding resources and authority to track and remove unauthorized and unpermitted mooring buoys.

Proposed solution:

Our goal is to address the management issues surrounding mooring buoys on state-owned aquatic lands via three mechanisms:

1. Require registration for all qualifying recreational mooring buoys

Under the current statute, mooring buoy registration with DNR is optional. By adding a registration requirement and administrative processing fee, DNR gains the ability to track and identify mooring buoys, increasing management effectiveness.

2. Clarify DNR's role in mooring buoy management

By clearly defining DNR's authority to actively manage unauthorized and unpermitted buoys, DNR gains the ability to enforce compliance with licensing and registration requirements.

3. Implement a Watercraft Excise Tax diversion to fund enforcement and compliance of unauthorized buoys

By implementing a 5% diversion of the Watercraft Excise Tax, DNR gains the resources needed to fund these compliance efforts and improve the condition of and access to state-owned aquatic lands for all users.

The Benefits:

This proposed statute change aims to:

- Reduce hazards to public health and safety
- Mitigate the impacts on tribal treaty rights
- Minimize private disputes and complaints
- Protect the aquatic environment
- Foster public enjoyment of SOAL

Commission Staff Highlights- August 28, 2026

Marine Resources Committees (MRCs) Support

MRC Grants: The grants funded with state and EPA/Partnership funds are in the final quarter of year one, with annual project reports coming due in the next month. Commission staff processed an amendment for Jefferson MRC and are starting to work on plans and timelines for the next two-year grant cycle.

MRC Staff meeting: A meeting of MRC staff is scheduled for late September. A summary of discussion and action items will be shared after the meeting.

Regional Projects

Kelp Plan: Staff worked with partners across Puget Sound on a few paragraphs describing kelp policy and funding in Washington for [the Kelp Forest Alliance's](#) State of Kelp Report, which will be presented at COP17 (UN Biodiversity) and featured again at COP31 (climate) in October and November.

Kelp Monitoring: Paddlers are mid-season in their kelp surveys, with no signs of slowing down! Representatives from each MRC paddling team joined NWSC staff in the Kelp Monitoring Workgroup summer meeting and shared what they have observed in the field and any successes or hurdles they faced. Overall, this appears to be a good year for most MRC-monitored kelp beds.

European Green Crab: Staff submitted the Interim Report to WA Department of Fish & Wildlife (WDFW) describing project efforts in Drayton Harbor (Whatcom County) and Samish Bay (Skagit County) for FY26. Additionally, staff provided an addendum (jointly written with Padilla Bay NERR for Ecology) for WDFW's annual report to legislators. In the field, staff coordinated with the Upper Skagit Indian Tribe to trap their tideland property in Samish Bay. WA Dept of Fish and Wildlife and WA Conservation Corps continue to support field efforts in Drayton Harbor and Samish Bay.

Voluntary No-Anchor Zones: NWSC staff continue to work with partners to write a series of blog/article posts highlighting key eelgrass protection areas around the Salish Sea. The most recent post featured [Seafarers' Park by the Port of Anacortes](#). More posts are in the works for the remainder of the boating season.



Derelict Vessels: NWSC convened the Derelict Vessel workgroup to meet July 30th to continue planning priority derelict vessel removals and prevention actions like turn-in recycling events. The workgroup, made up of MRC reps and Tribal partners prioritized 3 derelict vessels to remove and mapped out tentative plans for 2027 and 2028 vessel turn-in events. Staff are working with WA Dept of Natural Resources to move forward on the 3 vessels for removal and are discussing capacity to partner on future turn-in events. Additionally, NWSC staff facilitated an intergovernmental agreement between DNR and the Makah Tribe that has been signed. Planning coordination continues for a turn-in event with the Makah Tribe for September.

SoundIQ: Staff are working to maintain post-launch momentum for SoundIQ, support MRCs in using and promoting the tool, roll out a clear data-submission process, expand awareness among planners and partners, track real-world use, and continually refine SoundIQ based on MRC feedback.

Operations

Staff: No new updates on staff this month.

Budget: State fiscal year 2026 is closed, with final invoicing sent to WA Department of Fish and Wildlife for green crab activities to fully expend year one of the agreement. State funding for MRC grants was also fully expended. The last payment requests from counties are still being processed.

Communications: Staff are finishing the updated 2026 Communications Plan, which aims to provide unified messaging and strengthen coordination across the Commission/MRC network. Staff are working with MRC leads/reps to develop a clear workflow for coordinating local news releases following county protocol, the process is underway.

Contracts and grants: There are no new contracts this period and no activity on the Department of Natural Resources agreement for derelict vessel work.

Broad Community Engagement: Staff continue to determine how best to implement Community Connectivity Analysis at MRCs.
